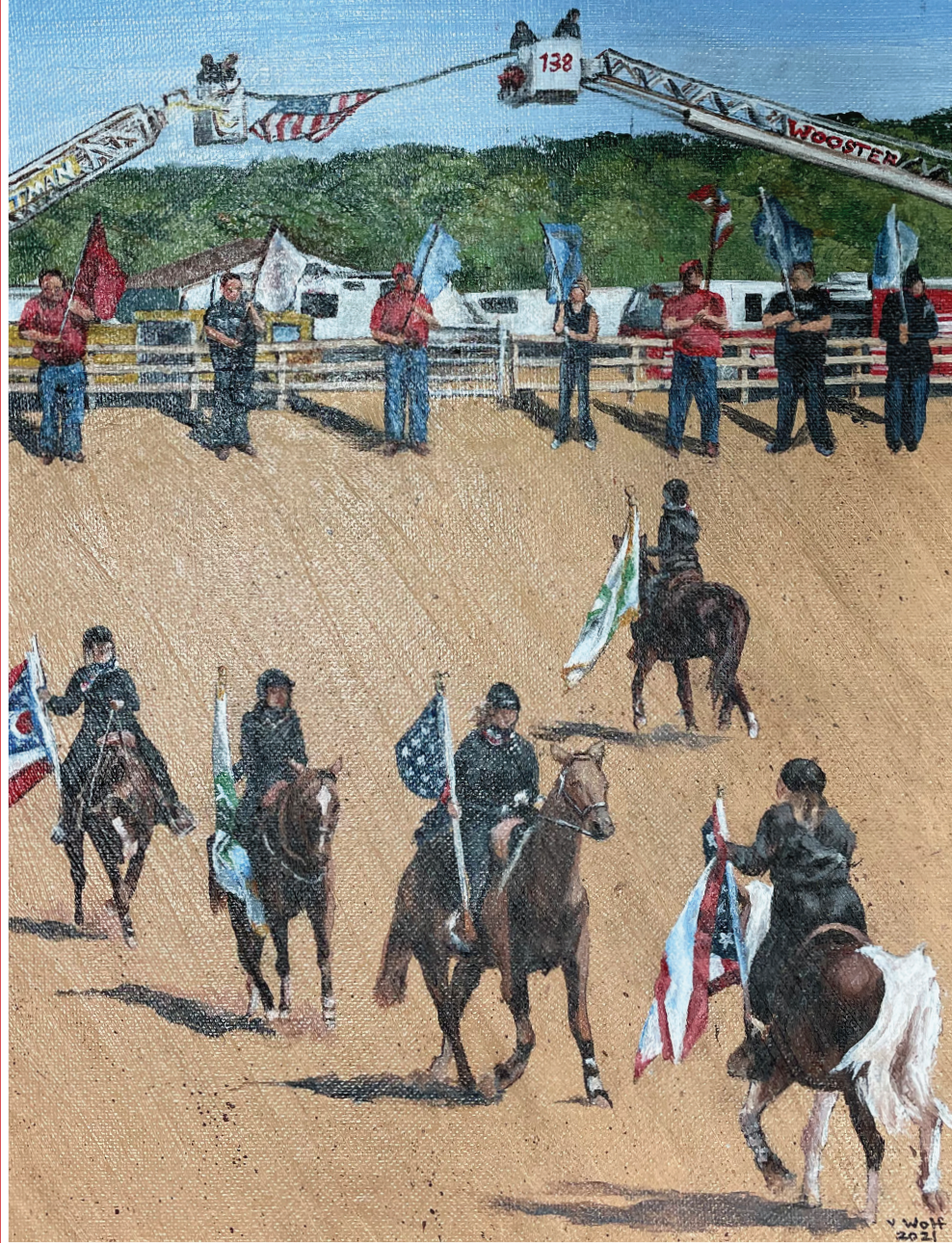


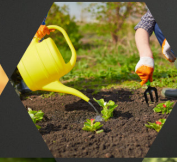

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WAYNE COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR GENERAL RULES

Applies to all Departments

ELIGIBILITY

1. Open to any boy or girl regularly enrolled in 4-H Club work or an FFA Chapter in Wayne County, provided such enrollment is on file with the Extension Office or the FFA Chapter by April 1st and the member is in good standing with OSU Extension and/or their FFA Chapter. To participate in fairs or other exhibitions the following membership statements will apply. Minimum age for the 4-H member is eight years and in third grade as of January 1 of current year. For the maximum age, the member must not have passed his or her 19th birthday on January 1 of the current year. In FFA the member must not have passed his or her 19th birthday on January 1 of the current year to be eligible.
2. To be eligible to enter a project in the Junior Fair, the entrant must establish membership in a 4-H club by April 1 or FFA Chapter in the preceding school year. Individual clubs or chapters may require earlier membership, but not later. The advisor of the youth group will visit or observe the project at least once. All Jr. Fair entries must be made online at the website <https://waynejrffair.fairentry.com> by 11:59pm on August 1st. However, livestock exhibitors must first input all possible animals (Animal Identification) they're bringing to the fair into the 4-HOnline database prior to making a fair entry. The deadline for inputting all animals in 4-HOnline is June 1st except for Market Rabbit, Market Ducks and Market Chickens which are due in 4-HOnline on or before August 1st.
3. Eligible youth may be members of both (4-H clubs) and Vocational Agriculture (FFA Chapters) or of either group. In all cases, separate & different projects (also different animals and/or products) must be carried in 4-H and in Vocational Agriculture by a member belonging to both organizations. The following examples will be considered different and separate projects: dairy herd management (cows in production), dairy heifers not freshened, sheep breeding, commercial market lambs, beef breeding, market beef (steers), swine breeding, market hogs, horse production, horse riding, laying flock, broilers, corn, soybeans, wheat, vegetable gardening, strawberries, electricity, woodworking, etc. When showing at fairs or other exhibitions, the same or similar animals and/or products cannot be shown in both organizations even though they may be carried under different projects or programs. Exhibits must be a part of the student's occupational experience program.
4. The completion of a 4-H project will be considered the interview at project judging or participation in Wayne County 4-H Skillathon or the Ohio State Fair Skillathon. The completion of an FFA livestock project is participation in Wayne County 4-H Skillathon or the Ohio State Fair Skillathon. Participation in project judging must be in Wayne County. These 4-H and FFA completed projects are then eligible for Wayne County Junior Fair participation.
5. All animals exhibited must have been in the complete possession and continual care of the exhibitor on and after June 1 of the current year, unless otherwise specified in Animal ID/Project Guidelines.
6. All livestock exhibitors must complete Quality Assurance training or test out on or before July 27th. If done outside of Wayne County, proof must be sent to the Extension Office before August 1.
7. The Junior Fair expects courteous and orderly conduct by the exhibitors and their attendants. Harassment, profanity or unsportsmanlike conduct toward Fair officials, judges, show manager, help, exhibitors or animals will not be tolerated. Any violations of this rule would warrant withholding of premiums won and exemption of showing at the Wayne County Junior Fair.
8. Individuals that are currently banned from exhibiting at any county, independent, or State Fair in the United States are not eligible to exhibit at the Wayne County Fair until such ban(s) are expired.

ANIMAL ID REQUIREMENTS

9. All animals exhibited must have been identified in the 4HOnline Animal ID system by June 1st of current year except Market Poultry and Market Rabbits which are due by August 1st of current year.

MAKING ENTRIES / CLASS CHANGES

10. Online entries will be required for all livestock, Family & Consumer Sciences and still project exhibits. They must be completed online no later than August 1, 2022 at 11:59 p.m.
11. All exhibits must be in place no later than 10:00 p.m. on Friday before the fair, or earlier and/or other times if determined by departments to be necessary. Those times are listed in this book.
12. Only one entry per member in a class, unless otherwise stated by departments (i.e. Horse, FFA).
13. Entries must be made with the club/chapter in which project is enrolled to be eligible for premiums.
14. All Jr. Fair entries must be made online at the website <https://waynejrffair.fairentry.com> by 11:59pm on August 1st. However, animal exhibitors must first input all possible animals (Animal Identification) they're bringing to the fair into the 4-HOnline database prior to making a fair entry. The deadline for inputting all animals in 4-HOnline is June 1st except for Market Rabbit, Market Ducks and Market Chickens which are due in 4-HOnline on or before August 1st.
15. Class changes must be made with Junior Fair Secretary. (A class change is not changing from a heifer to a cow class because you brought a different animal – rather, a class change is realizing your rabbit is a doe, not a buck – same animal but wrong class.) Member forfeits premium, but class change will be made.
16. Exhibitor will only be excused on days he/she is showing or selling an animal. Excused absence lists will be provided to the following schools: Central Christian School, Chippewa Local Schools, Dalton Local Schools, Green Local Schools, Hillsdale Local Schools, Kingsway Christian School, Northwestern Local Schools, Norwayne Local Schools, Orrville City Schools, Rittman Exempted Village Schools, St. Mary's Christian School, Southeast Local Schools, Triway Local Schools, Wayne County Schools Career Center, Wayne County Montessori School, Wooster Christian School, and Wooster City Schools. If your school is not listed, please ask your school's attendance officer to contact the Jr. Fair Secretary at wcfjfair@gmail.com

ANIMAL CHECK-IN / HOUSING / CARE

17. All animals must be checked in and in place by the times listed in the Jr. Fair Schedule.

18. Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) requires the completion of a Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) for market steers, market lambs, market hogs, market dairy steers, market goats, lactating dairy cattle, lactating goats, market rabbits and all market poultry. An electronic DUNF must be completed by the date specified in the August LINK newsletter. If an exhibition animal receives treatment after filing the initial DUNF, an updated DUNF must be submitted.
19. Animals may be inspected as they are unloaded (varies by department). If health is questionable, the fair veterinarian will be called and his/her word is final.
20. Once a market animal has crossed the Wayne County Junior Fair scale that is the official weight of the animal. Animals can be weighed-in only once. No back up animals can be weighed after the official weight has been read. A representative of the exhibition animal must be present when the weight is being read.
21. Before any care or treatment is given to an **exhibition animal** beyond daily care and approved grooming practices, a committee member, Junior Fair, or Senior Fair office must be notified. Once contact has been made the Wayne County Fair Vet will evaluate the animal to determine the best form of treatment. This includes but is not limited to drenching, injections, or any practice that can alter the state of an animal.
22. Animals are not permitted to be moved to a different pen or stall without permission from the respective livestock department committee chair or Jr. Fair Superintendent.
23. Animals which are ill and/or, in the opinion of the appropriate committee, do not make a good display, may be released from the fair. Health regulations governing Open Class entries also apply to all Junior Fair exhibitors.
24. Any market animal that dies between weigh-in and the sale, the exhibitor will be reimbursed at turn price for that day.
25. All bedding must be provided by Junior Fair participants, unless otherwise specified.
26. No painting permitted in barns without permission of Senior Fair Board.

GENERAL SHOW POLICIES/PROCEDURES

27. All Junior Fair exhibits will show in a combined 4-H and FFA class.
28. All 4-H/FFA members are expected to exhibit and sell their own animals. Exhibitors must be present to show in their market or showmanship class to sell. A Jr. Fair exhibitor may substitute for the exhibitor either in one class or in the sale, but not both. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who have a medical condition documented with a doctor's excuse or have conflicting shows.
29. First and second place winners will compete in championship classes at judge's discretion or as determined under each department.
30. Winners of showmanship classes are eligible to show in the next advanced class the following year. (Does not apply to Dairy)
31. Showmanship Classes will be placed 1-10 & Show Classes from 1-5 unless otherwise stated under individual departments.
32. Exhibitors in the Junior Fair are not permitted to wear any type of commercial advertisement or names on their clothing while in the show or sale ring. 4-H or FFA logos permitted.

AUCTIONS

33. All 4-H/FFA members are expected to exhibit and sell their own animals. Exhibitors must be present to show in their market or showmanship class to sell. Another Jr. Fair exhibitor may substitute for the exhibitor either in one class or in the sale, but not both. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who have a medical condition documented with a doctor's excuse or have conflicting shows.
34. All animals shown in Wayne County Junior Fair market classes (sheep, goat, swine, steer, poultry & rabbit) must be sold at the Junior Fair Auction if requirements have been met. Market animals must be shown in a market class in the exhibition arena to be eligible to sell in the auction. If the animal is ineligible, it will receive turn price
35. Animals sold at the Junior Fair Sale become the responsibility of the buyer but will be trucked to slaughter facility on trucks arranged by Senior Fair Board.
36. "Ohio Department of Agriculture (O.D.A.) requires mandatory testing of both urine and tissue samples of all Grand and Reserve Champion animals for hogs, sheep, beef and dairy steers. These Grand and Reserve animals must be sent to designated slaughter house for testing."
37. Note to Members with Market Livestock: Exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale MUST send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s). This "Thank You" note is to be delivered to the Wayne County Extension Office beginning the Monday after the fair in a stamped, sealed, and addressed envelope; and no later than one week after the sale. Checks for the sale of market animals will be sent to members only after a "Thank You" note is presented to the Extension Office.

MISCONDUCT / GRIEVANCE

38. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, trophies, awards or sale money won by such exhibitor may be withheld.
39. Should fraud or deception, and proof thereof, as determined by the appropriate committee(s), Junior Fair Liaison Committee and the Senior Fair Board be discovered after the animal or animals have been shown and prior to the sale, such animal(s) shall not be permitted to sell. The animals placing next in line at the show shall move up. Should violation be discovered after the sale, all sale money shall be returned to the buyer and the animal or carcass shall be returned to the exhibitor, if possible. All placings in show will stand. NO animals will move up.
40. When satisfactory evidence has been obtained by the appropriate committee(s), Junior Fair Liaison Committee and the Wayne County Agricultural Society (Senior Fair Board) that any of the livestock rules have been violated, the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's family may be barred from showing in any future Wayne

County Fairs. The minimum number of years the exhibitor and/or exhibitor's family may be barred from showing in any future Wayne County Fair is three (3) years before the right to a review. In case any premium shall have been awarded to animals shown in violation of this rule, the exhibitor will refund all premiums, trophies, awards, ribbons and sale money under such violation. Unless fraud and/or deception are involved, all championship placings stand.

41. Protests, grievances, accusations of cheating, misconduct, violations of rules, fraud, deception, or any other form of misconduct must be made in writing, signed by party or parties making protest, and filed with the Junior Fair Superintendent or Junior Fair Secretary accompanied by a protest fee of \$100.00, which will be retained by the Senior Fair Board if protest is not sustained. The Junior Fair Liaison Committee shall hear protests with the appropriate committee(s). All protests will be considered at a time set by the Junior Fair Liaison Committee and all parties will be notified. Jr. Fair Species Committees and the Building 10 Committee are not required to pay the \$100 protest fee when a majority of the committee agrees that a protest should be filed and the committee is the party bringing forward a protest.
42. "Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request."

EXHIBIT/ANIMAL RELEASE TIMES

43. Release Times:

- After 9:30 PM on Thursday night, only rabbit, poultry, sheep, and goats are released from their assigned pens and cages to be walked out of their assigned barn and off the fenced in fairgrounds.
- After 10:00 PM on Thursday night, all animals are released from their assigned pens/stalls to be walked to a trailer at their designated barn loading area or the infield within the fenced in fairgrounds.
- After 11:00 PM on Thursday night, all animals are permitted to be walked off the fairgrounds.

44. Rules:

- On Thursday night, all animals are to be in their assigned pens/cages/stalls by 8:00 PM (i.e. no "exercising" or "consolidating" animals) until their designated release time unless excused by the fair veterinarian and Department Superintendent.
- All animal release times are the same for Sr. and Jr. Fair exhibits.
- Each animal department committees will be patrolling their barns in teams of no less than two adult volunteer members and will report any infractions of the above rules to their Sr. or Jr Fair Superintendent
- There will be no parking on the track at any time on Thursday. Only infield parking will be allowed on the west side after 4:00 PM or after the last horse race. If the infield parking is full, any additional vehicles will not be permitted on the grounds until 10:00 PM

45. Consequences:

- Jr and Sr Fair animal exhibits/exhibitors in violation of the release times will be dealt with congruently
- Any exhibitor in violation of the exit times will share the violation at the family level
- The family will be suspended from exhibiting any Sr. or Jr. Fair entry at the Wayne County Fair for up to 3 years. The length of suspension will be at the discretion of the Wayne County Agricultural Society (Sr. Fair Board).
- If the family had entries participating in the Jr. Fair Sale, the project will be sold at the current turn price. Any proceeds above the turn price will be forfeited. These proceeds will be moved to the general 4-H scholarship fund.
- If the family participated in the dairy products auction, all proceeds earned will be forfeited. These proceeds will be moved to the general 4-H scholarship fund.
- All Jr. Fair and Sr. Fair premiums will be forfeited and or returned upon request.
- The family will be considered **not** in good standing with the Wayne County Fair and OSU Extension
- All family members will be removed from any active volunteer status
- Exhibitors will not be eligible to apply for 4-H scholarships.

46. Grievance:

- Any person found in violation of any rule may, at their choosing, and in accordance with the protest policy as written, offer a rebuttal. The exhibitor in violation will need to follow the Protest Policy (rule #41) as published in the Fair Book or within the Fair Book as published on the Wayne County Fair website.

PREMIUMS

47. Junior Fair premiums will be provided by the Senior Fair Board on all projects shown in a class (excluding Showmanship) in the following amounts:
Dairy, Beef, Horse..... \$15.00 Poultry, Rabbits.....\$7.00
Sheep, Swine, Goats..... \$12.00 All other exhibits.....\$6.00
48. Only 1 premium will be paid for each animal exhibited regardless of the number of classes entered.
49. If during the fair an animal becomes injured or ill, premiums will still be paid if a veterinarian's excuse is presented to the Junior Fair Office.
50. 4-H Cloverbuds must exhibit an individual project with their name displayed to receive a premium. There will be no evaluation of these projects.
51. Club/Chapter premium reports will be issued to Organizational Advisors Friday after fair ends. Any dispute of premium amounts must be made within 1 week. Premium checks will be paid no later than 30 days from the last day of the fair.
52. All premiums not drawn by the 30th of October of each year will be forfeited to the Senior Fair Board. This rule will be enforced to the letter.
53. Recipients of sponsored awards* (i.e. trophies, banners, etc.) MUST turn in a signed, sealed and stamped thank you note to the Junior Fair office by 10:00 p.m. on the last day of the fair (Thursday). Failure to turn in a thank you note will result in loss of premium. *Fair award recipients see #9 in Dairy Department rules.

DISCLAIMERS

54. The Senior Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of exhibits per exhibitor. The Senior Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of exhibitors. Further, the Senior Fair Board reserves the right to decline or accept any exhibit or exhibitor from entry to the Wayne County Fair for any reason or no reason at all.
55. Wednesday, September 14, the Wayne County Junior Fair Dairy Products Auction will be held in the Coliseum during the Showmanship classes (at 11 a.m.).

All exhibitors will need to be present in show apparel. Milk, cheese, and ice cream will be provided while dairy product items are available for auction.

The money raised from these items will be pooled and divided as follows: a flat fee of no more than \$1000.00 may be set aside for youth education activities, dairy youth trip, quiz bowl and judging teams.

Grand Champions: \$150.00; Reserve Grand Champions: \$100.00; Junior Champions: \$100.00; Reserve Junior Champions: \$75.00. Remaining money will be divided among all animals exhibited (including champions) at a 2-to-1 ratio (milking cows to dry cows/heifers). If Junior Champion goes on to win Reserve Grand or Grand Champion, they will be paid at the highest level obtained. Animal must be exhibited in the show ring or excused by a veterinarian to receive payment.

The 4-H & FFA Dairy Milkshake Trailer will be absorbing your sale committee 2% fee from the auctions, so exhibitors will be receiving 100% of the Dairy Products Auctions proceeds, as long as the Milkshake Trailer generates a profit.

1. Exhibitors shall be responsible for regular animal care, beginning on or before June 1st and continuing through the duration of the fair. An animal may only be exhibited by one junior fair member at one county/ independent Junior Fair and/or the Ohio State Fair. The same animal cannot be exhibited by another Junior Fair member at any other Junior Fair in the same year. If the animal is shown at another Jr. Fair, the exhibitor will lose premium and dairy products auction money.
2. All dairy animals must be in place by 10:00pm on Friday, September 9th. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST CHECK IN ON FRIDAY SEPTEMBER 9th from 4-10pm in the southwest corner of the Coliseum. (where the picture backdrop is located). New exhibitors will receive a show harness. *Those who do not check in will not be permitted to exhibit in the Junior Show and will not receive Dairy Products auction money.*
3. White clothes for boys and girls are required. Farm shirts are not permitted.
4. Only high grade or purebred animals may be shown in the Junior Fair Dairy show. An animal showing mixed breed characteristics may not be shown. Final decision is at the discretion of the dairy committee.
5. All dairy breed classes will be placed 1 through 10; showmanship classes will be placed in their entirety.
6. Only one entry per class. Exhibitors must make an entry for each class, including showmanship. Any heifer that has freshened will show in the 2 year old class. No more than one animal per class regardless of how the animal is entered.
7. All classes will show in order listed, large classes will be divided after check in, if necessary.
8. First place winners in each class, and second place at judge's discretion, are eligible for Junior and Senior Champion classes.
9. Dairy award recipients must turn in a signed, unsealed thank you note to the Thank You Box in the Coliseum. Failure to turn in a thank you note will result in loss of premium and auction proceeds.
10. All cows must be completely milked out prior to the start of the Outstanding Dairy Exhibitor cow class and Senior Supreme Champion. There will be time to milk out during the Junior Supreme and ODE heifer class.
11. When entering a Junior Fair animal in Open Class, specify on the Open Class entry that animal is to be shown in the Junior Fair.
12. All livestock will be housed in the Junior buildings unless permission has been granted by the Senior Fair Board to house them in the Coliseum.
13. In accordance with Ohio Law (901-19-04) no person shall: Administer or cause or permit to be administered a prescription or over the counter drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition; Exhibit an animal that has been tranquilized; or show, sell, or offer for sale any livestock which contains an unlawful substance or has been subjected to unacceptable practices. See Chapter 901-19 of the Ohio Administrative Code for more details and other rules and regulations.

1. This award will recognize the top individuals who exhibit excellence in several areas of their project. Score will be based on the following criteria:
 - 35% Exam
 - 5% Project Book
 - 40% Showmanship
 - 20% Breed Class Placing
 - 2 bonus points for participation
2. There are three divisions: Junior (8-11) Intermediate (12-14) and Senior (15-18); based on age as of January 1.
3. Each Exhibitor will select one animal to be shown in the mixed breeds class on Tuesday after the colored breed show is finished. Exhibitors participating must be in their show whites. Alternate leadsmen will be permitted for this class, providing the exhibitor communicates with the committee and the leadsmen must be the same age or younger. There will be two classes-one for heifers and one for cows. Cows must be milked out before the start of their class. The placement in this class will be used for the 20% class placing portion of the award - not the individual breed class placing.
4. Exhibitors have the opportunity to earn up to 2 bonus points to be counted towards their ODE score by participating in an Education Experience. A participation form must be filled out and turned into the Extension office by Sept 1. A list of approved activities is available on the Wayne County 4-H website.
5. The top three in each age division will be awarded in addition to the overall Grand and Reserve winners that can come from any age division. The overall winners will not be placed in their respective age division.
6. There will also be a first-year award given to the first-year exhibitor age 10 and under with the highest ODE score.
7. Ties will be broken first by Exam scores, secondly by book scores, lastly by showmanship scores
8. Awards will be presented at the 4-H Recognition Banquet in November.

MILKING PARLOR

- The Wayne County Dairy Service Unit, with cooperation from W. G. Dairy Supply is making every effort to provide exhibitors with satisfactory facilities for milking and the handling of milk at the fair.
- The milking parlor is an exhibit, which draws a lot of spectators and is a great public relations tool for the dairy industry. Your cooperation in helping to keep the parlor and cattle clean is important. Rinse/wipe cows off before coming to the parlor in the morning. **PLEASE DO NOT BRING DIRTY, MANURE-COVERED COWS INTO THE PARLOR.**
- We are fortunate that milk sold from the fair meets Grade B standards; therefore, we cannot accept milk from the barns. All milk is tested for antibiotics before it is shipped. Individual producers' samples may be checked randomly for the presence of antibiotics. Any exhibitor supplying milk in which antibiotics are found will be barred from selling milk at the fair and will be held financially responsible for any milk that would have to be dumped.
- The milking parlor will be under the direction of a supervisor in charge. The milking parlor will be open Friday, September 9, for 1 hour, 5:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. The milking parlor will be available on non-show days from 5:30 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. unless some special arrangements have been made with the parlor supervisor. On show days the parlor will provide a flexible schedule to accommodate exhibitors. To minimize the time that cows would need to stand in line waiting to be milked we are asking that exhibitors try to milk at the same time each day. We understand that variances in milking time are needed to properly fill udders prior to showing.

The proceeds from the sale of milk during the fair is a source of income for the Dairy Service Unit. The board will determine the cost of operating the parlor and its basic budget needs. DSU provides much support with scholarships, education, promotion, and sponsorship of 4-H and FFA programs. These would not be possible without the income from the milk sold at the Fair.

We look forward to servicing you at the fair and wish you success. Have an enjoyable fair, and let's make a good impression — it sells more milk and dairy.

4. From the Champion and Reserve Champion Market Division and the Champion and Reserve Champion WCBBR Division, an overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected.
5. All animals shown in the Wayne County Junior Fair market classes must be weighed at the fairgrounds and sold at the Junior Fair Auction.

THE MARKET STEER/HEIFER SHOW IS A TERMINAL SHOW.

6. Market steers and beef heifers must be on fairgrounds by 10:00 a.m. Friday prior to fair.
7. Market steers and beef heifers will be weighed Friday, September 9, beginning at 4:00 p.m. until 5:30 p.m. Re-weighing at discretion of weight master.
8. Owners are responsible for seeing that their animals are measured and weighed. Animals will be weighed at the nearest one pound.
9. Exhibitors must show their own animal if competing in showmanship.
10. All market steers and beef heifers shown must be sold at the Junior Fair auction on Thursday, September 15, following the swine sale. A charge will be made to the exhibitor to cover cost of the sale, insurance and beef check-off. Charges will be approximately 3%.
11. All animals must be shown at a tag-in in January, a beef committee clinic, a Winter/Spring jackpot or open show, or The Ohio State Fair. Copies of all documentation is due to the Extension Office by August 1st. For safety reasons, unruly animals that cannot be led or shown by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor will be dismissed from the fairgrounds at the discretion of the 4-H & FFA Beef Committee and the approval of the official fair veterinarian.
12. Horns limited to 2 inches (measured on underside).
13. Only member, immediate family, Wayne County Junior Fair members and Wayne County 4-H/FFA advisors are allowed to have "hands-on" on steer and breeding beef show day. If this rule is broken, animal will not be eligible to show in the junior fair or sell through the junior fair auction, but will be purchased at the bid price by the holder of the sale bid.
14. No twining (including artificial tail/tail head) and no paint or color altering of any kind. Refer to the general rules.
15. Adhesive must be removed from animals after the sale. Exhibitor must remove adhesive or forfeit sale price and only receive the turn price.
16. Steer must not have any testicular development.
17. For safety reasons all animals must be double tied.
18. All animals shown in the Wayne County Junior Fair market classes must be sold at the Junior Fair Auction.

THE MARKET STEER AND BEEF HEIFER SHOW IS A TERMINAL SHOW.

19. NOTE TO MEMBERS WITH MARKET LIVESTOCK: Exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale MUST send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s). This "Thank You" note is to be delivered to the extension office beginning the monday after the fair in a stamped, sealed and addressed envelope, and no later than one week after the sale. Checks for the sale of market animals will be sent to members only after a "Thank You" note is presented to the Extension Office.
20. A rope halter will be provided at the sale to tie your animal after it is sold. DO NOT TIE WITH ANYTHING ELSE OR COST OF HALTER WILL BE DEDUCTED FROM YOUR CHECK.
21. **There is a pen cleaning policy** – refer to August member letter (LINK). Policy is also posted in beef barn. Only mulch is to be used for bedding in steer and overflow barn.
22. Feed pans must be removed after feeding. Water buckets can be left all day only if secured to the wall.
23. If an exhibitor has a steer/heifer that dies and they receive a payout of the dead steer/heifer fund, that member is in-eligible to show any other beef project within that same class in Section 20.
24. Grooming chutes cannot come to the Fairgrounds until after 12 p.m. on Saturday of Labor Day weekend of the current year and no tape on the rails is permitted to hold spots. On Tuesday of Fair, no grooming chutes can be placed from the North entrance of the Coliseum Barn to the North entrance of the Coliseum Arena space so Dairy animals have room to come in and out for their show.

Section No. 20 – MARKET STEERS & HEIFERS

1. **Bred, Born and Raised Rule:** Exhibitors may enter only one class, either class 1 Market Beef Steer or class 2 Wayne County Bred, Born and Raised Market Beef Steer. The Junior Fair market show is a terminal show.

1. All 4-H/FFA members are expected to exhibit and sell their own hog. Exhibitors must be present to show in their Market or Showmanship class to sell. A Jr. Fair exhibitor may substitute for the exhibitor either in one class or in the sale, but not both. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who have a medical condition documented with a doctor's excuse or have conflicting shows. If no one is present to go through sale in order, hog will be sold at turn price.
2. The Drug Use Notification Forms (DUNF) must be filled out completely (with health papers if required) prior to unloading your hog. See August "link" for swine health requirements.
3. All market hogs must be barrows – **No gilts.**
4. **ONLY** market hogs weighing between 200 and 300 pounds will sell through the livestock auction and remain on the fairgrounds. Hogs weighing under 200 pounds and over 300 pounds will **NOT** show or sell. These hogs will leave the fairgrounds immediately after weigh in. These hogs will be sold at a local market decided upon by the committee or may be sent to a custom harvesting plant serviced by HMI. The member may still receive pork from their hog. Members will not show in showmanship or market class.
5. It is desirable that the market hogs at the Wayne County Fair weigh between 220 and 280 lbs.
6. Due to the limited space, 4-H and FFA members taking a market hog project can exhibit only 1 market hog at the fair.
7. All animals showing in a market class must be sold at the Junior Fair Auction on Thursday of the fair. A 3% charge to Grand and Reserve Champions, and a 2% charge per other head will be made to exhibitors to cover sale costs, bank fee and advertising.
8. **All swine exhibits must be weighed and in their pens by 9:00 p.m. on Friday, September 9, 2022. A member, family member, or authorized person must be present to pen the pig after the pig is weighed on Thursday or Friday.**
9. **ABSOLUTELY NO** livestock projects are to arrive prior to 4:00 p.m. on Thursday. Check-in hours are **4-9 p.m. on Thursday and 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Friday.** Projects arriving prior to 4:00 p.m. on Thursday will not be accepted as fair entries.
10. **ABSOLUTELY NO** decorations or tack are to be tore down or removed from the barn before 6:00 p.m. Thursday. If decorations or tack are removed before 6:00 p.m. on Thursday, the entire club/chapter will lose their premiums for their swine projects.
11. All award winners are required to turn in a stamped, unsealed thank you card to the Junior Fair Office by 10:00 p.m. Thursday of Fair.
12. **NOTE TO MEMBERS WITH MARKET LIVESTOCK:** Exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale **MUST** send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s). This "Thank You" note is to be delivered to the Extension office beginning the Monday after the fair in a stamped, sealed and addressed envelope, and no later than one week after the sale. Checks for the sale of market animals will be sent to members only after a "Thank You" note is presented to the Extension Office.
13. Clubs exhibiting in the swine department will be assigned a time(s) for aisle duty.
14. There is a pen cleaning policy – refer to August member letter (Link). Policy is also posted in swine barn.
15. Watering systems restricted to a gravity fed system with a 5-gallon maximum capacity per pen.
16. No personal/additional fans are permitted in swine barns. Additional ventilation will be provided at the discretion of swine committee, and/or fairboard.
17. Any hog that dies between weigh-in and sale, the exhibitor will be reimbursed at turn price for that day.
18. Clipping of market hogs will be allowed at the fair with a highly recommend hair length of ½ inch. Battery operated clippers can be used in the pens. Corded clippers can be used at the electrical outlets.
19. All Exhibitors must complete a Ractopamine Affidavit to be eligible to exhibit at the Wayne County Junior Fair. Affidavits are available at the Extension Office starting March 1st. They are due to the Extension Office June 1 and will be signed again at check-in.
20. No pen dividends shall be removed unless approved by the Committee and Senior Fair Board Swine Liaison.

- 5. The ear notch and photo must match the identification provided earlier on the Junior Fair entry and the Breeder Identification forms to be eligible to show in the Wayne County Born and Raised class.
- 6. **Bred, Born, and Raised Rule:** Exhibitors may only enter one class, either class 1 market class or class 2 Wayne County Bred, Born, and Raised class. All animals entering the Bred, Born, and Raised class must be Bred, Born, and Raised within the borders of Wayne County, Ohio. Exhibitors must have Wayne County Bred, Born, and Raised paperwork filled out and submitted by the respective livestock species Animal ID due date to be eligible to enter the class. If the paperwork is not completely filled out and submitted on time - the exhibitor cannot show in this class. The exhibitor must also make a Jr. Fair class entry for the Bred, Born, and Raised class by August 1st to be eligible for the class.

GENERAL PROJECT RULES

1. All Sheep projects must have a USDA official scrapie ear tag to be allowed to show at the Wayne County Fair.
2. You are not permitted to bring any lamb or sheep to the fair that is NOT going to be shown in a class.
3. Up to 10 lambs will awarded placement and receive a ribbon in each class.
4. No blocking and trimming in aisles at any time during the fair. Members are responsible for cleaning area when done trimming.
5. No drench gun unless there is a veterinarian/client relationship and this practice is required for the well-being of the animal. Also No Muzzles Allowed.
6. The restraint of a lamb on a continual or unattended basis in the pen shall not be permitted. After first warning, repeat offenders will be disqualified.
7. Water WILL be available to sheep at all times. After first warning, repeat offenders will be disqualified.
8. All 4-H/FFA members are expected to exhibit and sell their own animals. Exhibitors must be present to show in their market or showmanship class to sell. A Jr. Fair exhibitor may substitute for the exhibitor either in one class or in the sale, but not both. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who have a medical condition documented with a doctor's excuse or have conflicting shows.
9. Market Lambs and Slick Shorn Wether Type Ewe Lambs and Yearling Ewes will be weighed Friday, September 10 from 4pm-9pm at the Show Arena. Exhibitors are responsible for seeing that their animals are weighed. No market lambs can be shown or sold at the auction unless they have been weighed. Due to health concerns, market lambs, slick shorn wether type ewe lambs and yearling ewes must be washed and slick shorn within one week prior to arrival at the fair. Any lamb not found to have an acceptable length of fleece or cleanliness prior to weigh-in will not be allowed to weigh. (The Sheep committee recommends the use of at least a 13-tooth clipper comb.)
10. Any sheep project determined to be exhibiting signs of any contagious diseases, including fungus, at any time during the Fair will be dismissed. Any lamb showing signs of prolapse at any time will also be dismissed.
11. No sheep shall be permitted to leave the Sheep Barn or adjacent designated grooming areas during the show. After first warning, repeat offenders will be disqualified.
12. No sheep will be permitted to leave the designated exercise area during the Fair. For information regarding the designated exercise area see posting at the east side of the center fire wall near show ring. After first warning, repeat offenders will be disqualified.
13. The show order and other necessary instructions for breeding classes, market classes, and other Junior Sheep activities will be posted at the east side of the center fire wall near show ring. Please watch this bulletin board for important announcements during the week.
14. The show will be run using a card pull back system at the judge's discretion. The judge will award call back cards to any animal he wants to see again. If you receive a card be prepared to come back into the ring.
15. An exhibitor may show a breeding lamb in Breeding Sheep Showmanship and a Market Lamb in Market Sheep Showmanship.

Section No. 39 – MARKET LAMBS

1. All Market Lambs must have a USDA official scrapie ear tag uploaded into 4Honline by June 1st.

GENERAL RULES:

1. To comply with the ODA and the Scrapie Eradication Program, ALL goat projects must be ID'd (market, dairy, pygmy) and have an official USDA Scrapie identification tag, tattoo or electronic implant to be allowed to show at the Wayne County Junior Fair. Refer to Goat Project Guidelines sheet as to what documentation to bring to the Fair for the Scrapie Program.
2. ALL goats must check-in to be eligible for exhibition at the Wayne County Fair. All goats must be in place by 9:00pm on Friday before Fair. Market Goats and all Pack Goats in Class II need to be weighed at check-in.
3. There will be a Goat Exhibitor meeting on Wednesday, September 7 at 6:30pm. Exhibitors or a family member are encouraged to attend. Details regarding the fair, check-in procedures, shows, sale, etc will be discussed.
4. There will be no bucks or males with testicular tissue permitted on the fairgrounds.
5. One goat per class, per member, except in mother-daughter classes.
6. The age of a goat is determined as of September 1 of the current year for all goat classes.
7. No member may exhibit more than 3 goats at the fair.
8. No spiked or pronged collars of any kind allowed on the fairgrounds.
9. Exhibitors may identify a maximum of four (4) market animals per exhibitor in the 4-H Online system by June 1st.
10. Goat classes will be placed from 1 to 10.
11. Classes may be divided at the discretion of the committee.
12. No fitting in the alleys. It is recommended that dairy and market goats come clipped to the fair.
13. There is a pen cleaning policy. Refer to the August member letter (The Link). Policy is also posted in the barn.
14. All tack boxes should be placed on the back of the pen. No tack boxes in the aisles.
15. Shows will be run using a card pull back system at the judge's discretion. The judge will award call back cards to any animal he/she wants to see again. If you receive a card, be prepared to come back into the ring.
16. ALL goats must be checked/approved by the goat committee prior to being placed in their fair pens. All goats must be in place by 9:00pm on Friday before fair.
17. All market goats are eligible to participate in the rate of gain award. If a member wishes to participate, they must bring their market goat to the Goat Clinic on June 7 to have a beginning weight recorded. Goats must be weighed on a scale provided by the committee in order to participate.
18. All award winners are required to turn in a stamped, unsealed thank you card to the Junior Fair Office by 10:00pm Thursday of Fair.
19. NOTE TO MEMBERS WITH MARKET LIVESTOCK: exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale MUST send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s).  - 08 Beginner's Showmanship - 8 and 9 years old** limited to first year exhibitors in the goat department 8 and 9 years old. If the member shows in this class, he/she may not show in any other dairy goat showmanship class the same year.
- Pro Showmanship - Entry not required.** Winners from each age division class will compete for the pro showman title, the winner of pro showman will compete in Showmanship Challenge at the Pygmy Goat Show (where all 3 goat pro showmen will show market, dairy & pygmy goats) on Wednesday. The Showmanship Challenge winner will compete in the Showman of Showmen contest.

Section No. 77 –DAIRY MARKET GOAT CLASSES

1. Market goats must be dehorned with no horns/scurs longer than ½" from the base.
2. Exhibitors are limited to identifying 4 market animals per exhibitor by uploading full scrapie tag numbers and pictures to 4HOnline by June 1st.
3. All market goats can be a wether or doe, suggested birthdate of January 1st of current year.
4. ALL market goat classes must be sold on Wednesday at the Junior Fair Auction and **MUST GO TO MARKET. MARKET GOAT CLASSES ARE TERMINAL CLASSES.** Market Goats will be sold by the head, not by weight.
5. Only 1 market goat may be shown per member (including meat market & dairy market – only 1 total)
6. Classes will be divided by weight at the discretion of the Goat Committee.
7. First place in each weight break within a class will return for the Champion Market Goat Drive. The top 5 goats will be awarded in the WCBBR Dairy Market Goat classes and the Dairy Market Goat classes, with the Overall Grand and Reserve Grand Dairy Market Goats named from the top 2 in each.
8. A 3% charge to Grand and Reserve Champions and a 2% charge per head will be made to exhibitors to cover sale costs and advertising.
9. **NOTE TO MEMBERS WITH MARKET LIVESTOCK:** exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale **MUST** send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s). This "Thank You" note is to be delivered to the **EXTENSION OFFICE BEGINNING THE MONDAY AFTER THE FAIR IN A STAMPED, SEALED AND ADDRESSED ENVELOPE, AND NO LATER THAN ONE WEEK AFTER THE SALE.** Checks for the sale of market animals will be sent to members only after a "Thank You" note is presented to the Extension Office.
10. Dairy market goats must weigh 50 pounds and not exceed 120 pounds to sell in the Junior Fair Sale. Dairy goats weighing less than 50 pounds will be sent home and will not show or sell. Overweight animals will stay and show but are not eligible for awards or to go through the Jr. Fair Auction. Instead, overweight animals will receive turn price for their goats.
11. For tracking and loading purposes, all market goats will be housed together in one area. Do NOT move any market goat pens.

- 01 Dairy Market Goat** - Must be a dairy breed or crossbreed (examples: Nubian, Lamancha, Alpine, etc)
- 02 Wayne County Bred, Born & Raised Meat Market Goat** – All animals entering the WCBBR class must be Bred, Born & Raised within the borders of Wayne County, Ohio. Exhibitors must have WCBBR paperwork filled out and submitted by the respective livestock species Animal ID due date to be eligible to enter the class. If the paperwork is not completely filled out and submitted on time, the exhibitor cannot show in this class. The exhibitor must also make a Jr. Fair class entry for the Bred, Born and Raised class by August 1st to be eligible for the class.

Section 78 – UTILITY CLASSES – PET WETHER, PACK GOAT, HARNESS & CART CLASSES

1. In order to be eligible for any utility class, the goat and child must first show together in class 01.

Goats in this class must weigh in upon arrival at the fair. The committee will add 10% of the goat's body weight to the pack & the goat and member will navigate the obstacle course.

Section 79 – PYGMY GOAT OBSTACLE COURSE CLASSES

1. In order to be eligible for the Pygmy Obstacle Class, the goat and child must show the doe or wether in a Pygmy Goat Class (other than showmanship).

1. Exhibitor must make class entry.
2. Exhibitor Age for all classes is determined as of January 1 of the current year.
3. Showmanship is open to all eligible 4-H and FFA members.

1. No stallions may be exhibited except colts under 1 year of age (actual age).
2. Any unruly animal will be excused from the show by the steward.
3. A maximum size for the tack storage boxes is 48" wide, 38" deep and 58" high. All tack must be serviceable, safe and clean. Committee reserves the right to move your tack box if needed.
4. Junior Exhibitors – 4-H members 13 years old and younger on January 1 of current year.
Senior Exhibitors – 4-H members 14 and older on January 1 of current year.
5. 4-H horse and pony projects shall be judged on the basis of the member's ability to train, groom and show the animal disregarding the individual merits of the horse.
6. Classes will be divided into equal groups according to age of member if they need to be split. This will be done after entries are in the Junior Fair Office. Each class will be awarded one trophy and 10 ribbons.
7. Judging will be based on the recommendations in the publication "Uniform Rules for 4-H Horse Shows," and Wayne County 4-H Horse Committee By-Laws.
8. Each exhibitor may show in only one reining class per project animal (not including freestyle).
9. Members will not be excused from school unless they participate in at least one class on that day.
10. Members may enter no more than three (3) Dressage classes per horse/rider combination.
11. Members who stable equine at the Wayne County Fair and do not show each and every equine in any class will be barred from showing any equine at the Fair the following year and will forfeit their premium. Horses must remain stabled until official release time. Refer to General Rules for more details.
12. Walk-trot classes are open to first and second year exhibitors in this department or others with the Horse Committee's approval. Members who have previously shown in canter classes are not eligible.
13. A trophy recipient must turn into the Jr. Fair Office a stamped and addressed envelope a "thank you" note to the trophy sponsor (one note for each trophy received) before premium money will be distributed to the member. This should be done by 10:00 p.m. on Thursday of the Fair.
14. All Rotating Trophy recipients **must sign an agreement for the trophy between the recipient and Horse Committee. This agreement is available in the announcer's booth and must be signed the day the trophy is awarded. ALL ROTATING TROPHIES MUST BE RETURNED BY AUGUST 1 OF THE FOLLOWING YEAR TO THE JUNIOR FAIR OFFICE** (located on the fairgrounds), or the Extension Office.
15. The following is a listing of Rotating Trophies and their requirements:
 - Dwight & Bonnie McKee Rotating Trophy: awarded to the winner of the Versatility class.
 - Zimmerman Memorial Rotating Trophy: awarded to the high point contest senior participant in Poles, Barrels and New Stakes Race. Points for the trophy will be awarded in each contest class as follows: 1st – 10 points, 2nd – 9 points, 3rd – 8 points, 4th – 7 points, 5th – 6 points, 6th – 5 points, 7th – 4 points, 8th – 3 points, 9th – 2 points, 10th – 1 point..

16. There is a stall cleaning/animal care policy. Please refer to August member letter (LINK). Policy is also posted in the horse barn.
17. Walk Trot members may show only **ONE** equine project at the Wayne County Fair.
18. No member may bring more than two (2) equine to the Fair. In case of a shortage of stalls, the 4-H Horse Committee may request that members stall only one animal in the 4-H barn.

19. Exhibitors showing in Beginner Canter may not cross enter into their age group unless that same class is not offered for the beginner division.
20. Members may only show in one western showmanship class per horse/rider combination, except for tenderfoot. Members must enter the division (pleasure/contest) they predominately show in. Entries are subject to final approval by the 4-H Horse committee.
21. Members be aware of the Body Condition Score requirements in the "Uniform rules for 4-H Horse Shows". If your horse/pony has a body score less than 4 – you will not be able to exhibit or show your horse pony at the Fair.
22. No person shall alter, in any way change, or attempt to hide the natural markings of a horse by surgery, dye or in any other manner. The horse entered, stalled, and shown at the Wayne County Fair must match, identically in appearance, the horse pictured and described on the horse ID paperwork turned into the Extension Office June 1st of that year. The use of hoof dressing, including dressings that change the color of the feet, is optional and is not considered in judging.
23. Ground Roping: any 4-H or FFA member may show in the Ground Roping Class as long as they have completed a 4-H or FFA project of any kind during that 4-H year.

1. All poultry projects must be in place by Friday, September 9, at 9:00 p.m. Poultry projects can be checked in between 3:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. that Friday.
2. Poultry must come from an approved NPIP hatchery.
3. **Entries are to be checked upon arrival and sent home if exhibiting signs of illness or external parasites.**
4. **Animals sent home are disqualified and the participant is not eligible to show in the applicable class.**
5. All (non-market) Poultry projects must remain in the cage on Thursday from 8:30 p.m. until 9:30 pm (the designated release time for the barn). Animals removed from the Rabbit-Poultry barn before the designated release time without a vet release certificate will forfeit their premium and will not be eligible to exhibit in that project the following year.
6. **A long sleeved, plain white shirt or white coat is required for showmanship, breed & market classes (not to sell)** Exhibitors in the Junior Fair are not permitted to wear any type of commercial advertisements or names on their clothing while in the show ring.
7. **All Market Poultry projects are REQUIRED to provide a completed Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) to the Fair. Bring the form to the Fair and turn it in when you check in your animals. Forms will be available at the Skillathons at the Extension Office.**
8. There is a pen cleaning/animal care policy. It will be posted in the August Link 4-H Newsletter.
9. Poultry exhibitors can only make one entry per class; however, they are not limited to the number of classes they enter.
10. All poultry classes, including showmanship, will be placed 1-5.
11. Exhibitors are not permitted to bring additional birds into the barn to sell or exhibit after Friday, September 10, at 9:00 p.m. Exhibitors are not permitted to post "For Sale" signs on cages.
12. Only Jr Fair animals are permitted to be caged in the Jr Fair section of the barn.
13. Only another 4-H member can show and/or hold your poultry project during the show. Cloverbuds are not eligible to show and/or hold your poultry project during the show.
14. All 4-H/FFA members are expected to exhibit and sell their own animals. Exhibitors must be present to show in their market or showmanship class to sell. A Jr. Fair exhibitor may substitute for the exhibitor either in one class or in the sale, but not both. Exceptions will be made only for exhibitors who have a medical condition documented with a doctor's excuse or have conflicting shows.
15. Small cage decorations and tack may be taken down and removed before the animal release time (9:30 p.m. Thursday); however, large hanging signs and decorations that require a stool or ladder to take down must remain in place until after 10:30 pm Thursday or the barn has cleared. Market exhibitors are encouraged to clean their pens and remove supplies any time after animals leave on Wednesday night.

4. All Poultry Meat Pens will sell at the Junior Fair Auction following the Goat, Rabbit and Lamb Auction. The order of sale will be determined by the Junior Rabbit and Poultry committee. Each class will start with the Grand and Reserve Champion, followed by the rest of the pens in that class. Grand and Reserve Champions will be charged a 3% fee while all other exhibitors will be charged a 2% fee to cover banking, sale and advertising costs.
5. All Meat Pens will be weighed on Friday at the time of check-in/inspection in poultry barn. Member should be present for weighing.
6. **NOTE TO MEMBERS WITH MARKET LIVESTOCK:** exhibitors selling their animal(s) at the Junior Fair Sale MUST send a "Thank You" note to the buyer(s). 2. Members are limited to three (3) entries plus a meat pen in the Junior Fair Rabbit Show. In case of excessive entries this number may be reduced at the discretion of the committee.
3. Health certificates (papers) are not required for rabbits. Entries are to be checked upon arrival and sent home if exhibiting signs of illness or external parasites.
4. All Rabbit projects must remain in the cage on Thursday from 8:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. (the designated release time for the barn). Animals removed from the Rabbit-Poultry barn before the designated time without a vet release certificate will forfeit their premium and will not be eligible to exhibit in that project the following year.
5. **A long-sleeved, plain white shirt or white coat is required for showmanship and market breed classes (but not the sale.)**
6. There is a pen cleaning/animal care policy, which will be posted in the August Link 4-H Newsletter.
7. All rabbit projects must be in place by Thursday, September 8, at 9:00 p.m. Rabbit check-in time, Thursday 3pm-9pm. Exhibitors are not permitted to post "For Sale" Signs on their cages at the Fair.
8. All Rabbit classes, including showmanship, are placed 1-5.
9. Only another 4-H member can show and/or hold your rabbit project during the show. Cloverbuds are not eligible to show and/or hold your rabbit project during the show.
10. Small cage decorations and tack may be taken down and removed before the animal release time (9:30 pm Thursday); however, large hanging signs and decorations that require a stool or ladder to take down must remain in place until after 10:30 pm Thursday or the barn has cleared. Market exhibitors are encouraged to clean their pens and remove supplies any time after animals leave on Wednesday night.
11. All Rabbits, excluding market, must have an identification tattoo in their left ear before the time of check in at the fair. Only Exhibitor Bred Born & Raised will receive a tattoo at check in at the fair.

Section No. 110 – MEAT RABBITS

Meat Pens will be weighed on Thursday at the time of check-in/inspection in rabbit barn. Exhibitors should be present.

1. Meat pens consist of three (3) rabbits that must be of same commercial breed and same variety.
2. Market rabbits must be 8-10 weeks old as of the Saturday of the fair.
3. Rabbits in Meat Pens are to be as close as possible to identical structure.

1. Review General Regulations for Junior Fair Livestock Exhibitors.
2. Dog Obedience and Showmanship members are required to complete the project judging or Skillathon; check with advisor for dates. Review judging options on Guideline sheets.
3. For safety reasons, any female dog that appears to be in estrus and any dogs showing unruly behavior, signs of aggression, or general unsoundness, contagious diseases, or parasites are dismissed from showing and must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds.
4. Dog must be on a leash and under control of the 4-H member at all times when on the fairgrounds and stay in the show arena. Exhibitors are to clean up after their own dogs at all events.
5. For **Showmanship** classes it is recommended exhibitors wear dress pants and collared shirts or skirt, suit or dress, at least knee length. For Obedience, colored dress jeans or dress pants are appropriate. *Inappropriate clothing includes T-shirts, jackets or other apparel with words; shorts; sandals; flip-flops; clogs; high heels or other similar footwear.*
6. **Showmanship collars** include a chain or slip collar or martingale-type show lead. Nothing shall hang from the collar. Leashes may be of fabric or leather and long enough for easy handling of dog. Chain leashes and pronged collars/pressure collars are not acceptable.
7. **Obedience collars** include well-fitting plain buckle or slip collars of an appropriate length permitted. Nothing shall hang from the collars. Leashes may be of fabric or leather and be 6 feet long. Chain leashes and pronged collars/pressure collars are not acceptable.
8. The judge may dismiss from the ring any dog exhibiting unsafe or threatening behavior or any member abusing the dog.
9. Judges and/or show officials have the right to disqualify any participant exhibiting poor sportsmanship from showing, or from receiving any awards, at any time during the Dog Show, as well as order the removal from the Fairgrounds of anyone showing unsportsmanlike conduct. This is in addition to participants having points deducted from the Sportsmanship category on their score sheets.
10. Show committee reserves the right to combine classes. The Dog Show order will be Showmanship, then Obedience, then Rally. All classes will start with the most advanced then work down to beginners.
11. In order to exhibit at the fair, each exhibitor must submit permission to participate form, animal identification information, health/vaccination certificate, and photo or copy of their dog license online at oh.4honline.com on/or before June 1st.
12. Unless specifically stated otherwise, all Ohio State Fair Dog Show rules will be followed. A copy of Ohio State Fair Dog Show rules is available online at <http://go.osu.edu/osfdog>

Section No. 130 – SHOWMANSHIP

1. Exhibitor must make class entry
2. Age for all classes is determined as of January 1st of the current year.
3. Showmanship is open to all eligible 4-H and FFA members
4. Exhibitors must show their own project animal in Junior Fair Showmanship classes. The judge reserves the right to ask exhibitors to switch animals during the course of the class
5. The Committee reserves the right to divide and adjust classes.
6. Classes will be placed 1-10
7. Showmanship selection is based on member's ability to prepare, train and show animals. Dog should be cleaned and groomed; trimmed appropriate for breed type.
8. Showmanship will start with the oldest age group and work down.
9. All award winners are required to turn in a stamped, unsealed thank you card to the Junior Fair Office by 10:00p.m. on Thursday of Fair.
10. Age Divisions are: Senior 15-18 Intermediate 12-14 Junior 8-11 Beginner: 1st year showing

*Note: “A” classes are for beginners of each category; “B” classes are for experienced members of each category.

Graduate Open

- Class 5 Graduate Open B** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Graduate Open level of Obedience. Members may return with the same dog every year.
- Class 6 Graduate Open A** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Graduate Open level or a higher level of Obedience. Members may only show in this class one year.
- Class 7 Open B** members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Open level, who have not yet progressed to the Graduate Open level or higher. Members may show in this class two years.
- Class 8 Open A**– members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Open level, who have not yet progressed to the Graduate Open level or higher. Members may only show in this class one year.
- Class 9 Graduate Novice B** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Graduate Novice level. Members may show in this class two years.
- Class 10 Graduate Novice A** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or the dog has had any prior experience at the Graduate Novice level. Members may only show in this class one year.
- Class 11 Novice B** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has shown in Novice A or has had experience at the Novice A level or higher. Members may show in this class two years.
- Class 12 Novice A** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor or dog has had any prior experience at the Novice level. Members may only show in this class one year.
- Class 13 Pre-Novice** – is on leash and is for members of all ages that either the exhibitor or dog has shown in Beginner Novice A, Beginner Novice B and/or Pre-Novice previously. Members may show in this class three years. Members can repeat this class with same or different dog unless a class winner, OR can show in Beginner Novice B unless a class winner. Once a class winner in Beginner Novice B and Pre-Novice, then the member must move to Novice A.
- Class 14 Beginner Novice B** – is partially off leash and is for members of all ages that either the exhibitor or dog has shown in Beginner Novice A, Beginner Novice B and/or Pre-Novice. Members may show in this class three years. Members can repeat this class with same dog or different dog unless class winner, OR can show in Pre-Novice unless class winner. Once the member is class winner in both Beginner Novice B and Pre-Novice, then they must move to Novice A.
- Class 15 Beginner Novice A** – members of all ages that neither the exhibitor nor dog has had any prior experience at any level. Members may only show in this class one year and must move to Beginner Novice B or Pre-Novice after completion.

*Note: Members may switch back and forth between Pre-Novice and Beginner Novice B if they comply with the following restrictions: 1) Once you win a class you may not compete in that class again. 2) You are only eligible to show in the Beginner Novice B class and the Pre-Novice class for 3 years each.

Section No. 132 – RALLY

Classes are listed from most experienced (Rally Intermediate) to least experienced (Rally Novice A).

Rally is a sport that follows a course from one sign to the next, with the handler and dog performing the skill listed on each sign before proceeding to the next sign. Rally differs from obedience in that the exhibitor may communicate with the dog by multiple commands, including speaking and hand signals, etc. The dog and handler must work as a team with the dog under control within a 2-foot area at the handlers left side. The handler may not touch the dog or give physical corrections. There are 10-20 signs per course depending on level and are done entirely on a leash. The signs are numbered, and members are given time to walk the course before the class starts. When in the course with your dog; it is timed for placement.

- Class 16** Rally Intermediate is for members of all ages and their dogs that either the exhibitor or dog has previously shown in Rally Novice B. Members and their dogs must have previously competed in Rally Novice B for two years before moving to Intermediate.
- Class 17** Rally Novice B is for members of all ages and their dogs that either the exhibitor or their dog has previously shown in Rally Novice A. Members and their dogs should show in this class for two years.
- Class 18** Rally Novice A is for members of all ages and their dogs that are showing in Rally for the first time.

Section No. 133 – OUTSTANDING DOG EXHIBITOR-ENTRY REQUIRED

1. Entry into this class must be made by August 1st in FairEntry online.
2. Your animal must be identified in 4-H online by June 1st.
3. This award will recognize the top individuals who exhibit excellence in several areas of their project.
4. Score will be based on the following criteria:
 - 35% Exam
 - 10% Project Book
 - 15% Showmanship
 - 15% Obedience
 - 10% Rally
 - 15% Poster

5. There are three divisions: Junior (8-11) Intermediate (12-14) and senior (15-18); based on age as of January 1.
6. A participation form must be filled out and turned into the Extension office by Sept 1 for the participation bonus points. A list of approved activities is available on the Wayne County 4-H website.
7. The top three in each age division will be awarded in addition to the overall Grand and Reserve winners that can come from any age division. The overall winners will not be placed in their respective age division.
8. Ties will be broken first by Exam scores, secondly by book scores and lastly by showmanship.
9. Awards will be presented at the end of the dog show.

4. Poster must be on a regular sheet of poster board measuring 22" x 28". FOAM BOARDS ARE NOT PERMITTED at the judging events or fair for exhibiting projects.
5. Entries must be submitted via the FairEntry Online website (waynejrfair.fairentry.com).
6. Only one entry per member permitted in a class.
7. Each club will receive premiums on no more than two group projects. If your club has more than two group projects the members can take the opportunity to be individually judged at either the July or August Project Judging event.
8. Welding and woodworking projects – nothing wider than 5 ft. will be permitted to exhibit in the Junior Fair Building. If a project is larger than 5 ft. in width, the member must bring a poster project with pictures for display at the Fair.
9. Members must exhibit projects in their club booth or the center aisles of the Junior Fair building to be eligible for premium awards.
10. Projects to be exhibited in the center aisle should be dropped at the Jr. Fair Building between 9:00 am-12:00 pm on Labor Day.
11. All Junior Fair Building exhibits must be in place by 3:00 pm on the Friday before the fair; release time is from 9:00 am-12:00 pm on the Friday after the fair.
12. The following items are prohibited from use in any Junior Fair Building displays, either club booth or center aisle:
 - A. Easily flammable materials such as straw, shavings, hay, sawdust, pine needles, etc.
 - B. Items of high monetary value

5. Only one entry per member permitted in a class, except where otherwise indicated. Each member will receive a \$6.00 premium per project, except for livestock projects (see page 7 for more details); chapters will receive \$25.00 per chapter exhibit.
6. All student exhibits in the FFA Building must be labeled with an FFA name tag.
7. All FFA exhibits must be in place by 4:00 p.m. on Thursday before the Fair.
8. All projects in Sections 200 and 220 will be judged on Tuesday before the Fair. All projects in Section 210, as well as Chapter exhibits, will be judged on Friday before the Fair.

Section No. 200 – CROPS (General)

2022 SEASON/OHIO'S LIVESTOCK HEALTH EXHIBITION RULES

901:1-18-01 Chapter's application.

- (A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- (B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

- (A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under chapter 1711. of the revised code; or the Ohio state fair; or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- (B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- (D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the state of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services, to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6, or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556.
- (F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of transmission by any means from a carrier animal to a human or to another animal and includes dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules - Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 Exhibitions: sanitation, inspection and records.

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, stall, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;
 - (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;
 - (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
 - (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
 - (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
- (C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 Exhibitors.

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal, shall make available any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- (D) Each person who presents for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 of the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

901:1-18-05 Poultry and fowl

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph; or

- (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraph (A)(2),(A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 Cattle.

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
- (1) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
 - (2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;
 - (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
 - (4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
 - (5) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under six months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty- four months of age (beef); and
 - (6) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre- entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.
- (C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 Goats.

- (A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.
- (B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
 - (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02 (G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
 - (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
 - (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) If originate from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 Horses, mules and ponies.

- (A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition.
- (B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (2) If the animal is twelve months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within twelve months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio department of agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within thirty days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 Sheep.

(A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."

901:1-18-10 Swine.

(A) Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
- (3) Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage IV area shall:
 - (a) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (b) Originate from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.

(B) Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (a) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage IV area; and
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.
